It's been there, it's been 4 in use, basically, forever, and we're proposing 5 to continue to use it, but because we're now going to have two lots that are technically 6 landlocked, that are reached by easement, we need 7 a variance for that. And then, Keenan Hughes is a professional planner, and he will cover the variance.

CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Okay. Thank you. Call your first witness.

MR. TRIPP: My first witness will be James Sens. And I believe he is on as a panelist. Mr. Sens, are you here?

MR. SENS: Yes, I am.

MR. TRIPP: Thank you. And we would like to start with Exhibit A-1.

JAMES SENS, having been duly 16 sworn, testified as follows: 17

> MR. ALFIERI: Can you please spell your name for the record?

MR. SENS: James, J-A-M-E-S, Sens, S-E-N-S.

MR. ALFIERI: And could you please provide your qualifications for the board?

MR. SENS: Yes, I have a bachelor's in engineering technology from the New Jersey

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Institute of Technology. I'm a licensed professional surveyor in the state of New Jersey since 2002. I've testified in front of numerous boards throughout the state, and been accepted as a professional surveyor. I will say, I have not testified under these circumstances before, so this is a new experience for me, but thank you for the opportunity. MR. ALFIERI: Does the board accept

his qualifications?

CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Can I have a motion to accept his credentials?

BY MR. TRIPP: 22

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Q. So, Mr. Sens, you were the surveyor of record for the subdivision plan that was submitted?

A. That is correct.

O. And I'd like to call up Exhibit A-1, which I believe was prepared by your office. You should do a screen share at this point, or...

CHAIRMAN DAVIS: We're working on that right now.

(Whereupon, there is a brief pause in the proceeding.)

MS. MAGNANI: Good? MR. TRIPP: That works.

BY MR. TRIPP:

Q. Mr. Sens, this is Exhibit A-1. Can you tell me what it shows?

A. It depicts the subdivision boundaries, but also the existing conditions, and the existing lot lines as well. It depicts property, existing nine tax lots, and those lines which are to be eliminated. The existing tract contains 86.197 acres. It also shows the proposed block configurations as well.

Q. The existing lot lines are in red; the proposed is in green. Correct?

A. That's correct.

Q. And can you just briefly describe

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the property, just in terms of putting on the record what I had said earlier regarding the access, and where the property -- the zoning of the property?

A. Yes, the property is currently zoned -- it's in two-zone classifications, actually, it's in the I, Industrial, and the MW, Marine Waterfront. The zone boundary cuts, essentially, through the middle of the property. It runs along the existing lot line, between Lots 1 and 6, I believe. It's a little hard to see on that, but it's the long line that runs across the whole entirety of the property, roughly in the middle. The property, again, is made up of the nine existing tax lots.

The use on the property is some existing old, obsolete buildings from a prior steam print -- steam plant use -- I guess it's been a long day. There's three electrical substations located to the -- on the northerly or northwesterly end of the property. There's some ancillary infrastructure that goes along with that: some overhead wires, transmission lines, cables, and relays such as that.

And there's also, within what's

going to be the new lot, 1.01, there is the current power plant; the combustion turbines; some existing storage tanks for demineralized water; concrete pads for the water storage tanks prior; some modular buildings for administrative offices; locker rooms; things like that.

The entrance to the property is kind of cut off, in my view of this, but it's sort of to the bottom sheet right, if you will. You can see where Sayreville Boulevard is, and River Road makes a bend to the north.

At the end of River Road, there's a driveway that cuts through, and the easement—it's through the Sayreville Economic Redevelopment Authority. The driveway has existed for a long time in that location. The easement across the property is blank; it doesn't define the exact location, but, again, the use has been there and the driveway's been there for a very, very long time, and that is how the property is accessed, through that existing drive.

I think that describes the existing conditions of the property.

CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Any questions from

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the board?

COMMISSIONER D'ADDIO: Chairman, this is Mike D'Addio. Probably for Jay or our attorney, should SERA have been involved at all in this regarding the easement?

MR. CORNELL: Mr. Chairman, this is a preexisting easement that predates SERA owning that property. So I don't know that SERA needs to be involved, because this is just an access easement across a piece of property that was previously owned by someone else, that SERA eventually took ownership too. There's no changes proposed to the easement, so I don't know that SERA would need to be involved.

CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Thank you, Jay.
COMMISSIONER D'ADDIO: All right.

Then I guess it's more of a legal question than
an engineering question. If the property was
owned by somebody else and ownership transferred,
does the easement automatically transfer?

MR. ALFIERI: The easement normally runs -- well, the easements run with the land. So unless there is some change to the easement by the new owner and the easement beneficiary, then the easement would run with the land, and there

would be no changes at all. So it doesn't matter who necessarily owns the property. It doesn't impact the easement unless there's something in

the easement that would stipulate that.

MR. TRIPP: And this is Steve Tripp.

I was temporarily disconnected; I'm back on.

Yeah, basically, the operations of the site are going to remain the same. We're creating a lot line, we're moving some of the structures to consolidate the power plant operation, but nothing's changing. So there's no significant change that would trigger any issues with the easement at this point.

COMMISSIONER D'ADDIO: Okay. All right. I'm good with that. BY MR. TRIPP:

Q. Mr. Sens, in terms of the -- back to the Exhibit A-1.

A. Yes.

Q. Or maybe we should -- you know what? We should go to -- let's see, we have Exhibit A-1. And can you just explain, now, what we're doing, in terms of the purpose of the subdivision?

A. The purpose of the subdivision is

Pages 13 to 16

to consolidate all the operations of Sayreville Power, LLC, onto a, you know, single, self-contained lot, that being Lot 1.01, and the other uses of the property would remain on Lot 1.02, and to consolidate all those various nine existing packs of lots into the two new lots.

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Correct?

Q. And moving to Exhibit A-2, can you just show what that is, and explain that? Okay. And this is --

A. And the configuration of the new lot -- or the -- I guess it's easier to say the new Lot 1.01 is located in the lower right-hand corner of the sheet that we're looking at, it follows some existing fencelines, and consolidates, again, the uses into a single lot, and which is already, you know, defined in the field, and on the site, and marked out by that fence. That's where that lot, the new lot, is.

And the blue is the location of the modular administrative building. There used to be a tank on that pad, but that is going to be relocated, and the administrative building's going to be located to that location. But, essentially, the lot configuration that is proposed follows the existing fencing around

this use.

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O. Now, the proposed Lot 1.02, the 71 arc lot, that will have the substations; the remains of the prior steam plant. It also will have a couple of structures, correct, that are related to the power plant, and there'll be easements for the benefit of Lot 1.01. Can you just explain briefly what that is?

A. That's correct. So, again, the entrance to the property, coming across that blanket easement, there's an existing driveway that goes into the new proposed lot. And, essentially, we've created a new easement to -again, it's kind of hard to explain, but it comes from the existing driveway and makes a 90-degree, essentially, turn, to the north, to provide access to Lot 1.02, and those uses that you've outlined.

O. And that's the existing -- that's really the existing point of access, correct, that is used now?

A. That is correct.

Q. When you get to that part of the site, the only difference is there's going to be a lot line and we're going to have an easement.

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A. That is absolutely correct, functionally, nothing changes with that, that's exactly right.

Q. And in the planner's report, there was a -- and I'm -- there was a question about access, and about the configuration, make sure that emergency vehicles can get through. We've looked at that, and we'll agree - am I correct in saying we'll agree to do a little template, and if we need to widen it or change the geometry slightly, we can do that, certainly, before we record an easement? Correct?

A. Absolutely. There was a question about whether the turning radius at the 90-degree bend, so to speak, would be adequate for safety vehicles and other heavy vehicles. We'll run a template through that, and make sure that that works, and if we have to revise this configuration, we would do so prior to recording or perfecting anything.

Q. And that can be done without affecting any of the other structures. Correct?

A. That is correct.

O. And the other easements that you've

shown on 1.02 are for certain structures that relate to the power plant. Correct? Relay cables or relay house.

A. That's right.

O. Transmission lines. A gas circuit breaker.

And there's going to be easements provided so that Lot 1.01 will be able to access those facilities in Lot 1.02. Correct?

A. That's correct. Whatever functioning mechanicals, or what have you, that is required, there will be access provided from -- across 1.02, for the benefit of 1.01.

O. And in terms of the variances, the only variance that's created, am I correct, is the planning variance I alluded to earlier, because there's an easement from River Road to get to this property, rather than --

A. That's correct.

O. And it doesn't front on a right-of-way?

A. It doesn't front on a right-of-way, that's absolutely right.

Q. I'm going to ask you -- you're aware of the comment in the planner's report

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that there were some questions about your zoning table, and whether certain structures and setbacks shown were compliant. Did you take a look at all of the setbacks for the structures that are existing, and the relocated administration building, look at all the lot lines, and determine whether or not any are noncompliant?

A. We did go -- I'm aware of the comments, and we did go back and look. In particular, in the zoning table, we have -- for both Lot 1.02 and 1.01, we have conditions shown in the rear, but, in fact, in reviewing the zoning, and discussing it with the planner, we believe we are actually in the side yard, and, therefore, our combined -- are conforming. The setbacks that we are proposing are 123.4 and 42.4. And these are both accessory structures, so the setback that would be required is 37.5. So we'll update the table to reflect that.

Another comment he had was concerning where the driveway something comes into — or the proposed driveway, or proposed easement, rather, comes in to Lot 1.02, and he believed we should interpret that as a front

yard with a 100-foot setback. I don't have an issue with that, there's no structures proposed or existing within that setback, as it is now, so we'll modify the plan, as well, to reflect that as a front yard with a 100-foot setback.

Q. And there was one other thing in the zoning table regarding an 85.9 foot side yard setback, that's also an accessory structure, and it exceeds the 37.5, and the combined side yard also exceeds the requirement of the combined side yard. Correct?

A. That is absolutely correct, that is an accessory structure, and with that being 85.9, essentially 86 feet, you know, there's -- all the other structures out there are all in excess of 15 feet, so the -- form the property lines. So the combined side yard is easily met.

Q. And you'll correct -- as a condition of any board action, you'll correct the zoning table to reflect these conditions?

A. Absolutely.

MR. TRIPP: I don't have any further questions of Mr. Sens.

CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Any board members have any questions?

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Hearing none, we'll move to your next witness, please.

MR. TRIPP: Sure. Martin Ballod.

MR. BALLOD: I'm present.
MR. ALFIERI: Martin, could you

please state and spell your name for the record?

MR. BALLOD: Yes, my name is Martin
Ballod, M-A-R-T-I-N, Ballod, B-A-L-L-O-D.

MARTIN BALLOD, having been duly sworn, testified as follows:

MR. ALFIERI: Can you please provide your qualifications for the board?

MR. BALLOD: Yes, I am a licensed professional engineer in the state of New Jersey since 1985. I have a master's degree in civil engineering from Villanova University --

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: [Inaudible] -- his credentials.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Second.
MR. BALLOD: Excuse me?

CHAIRMAN DAVIS: His credentials are accepted, thank you.

23 MR. TRIPP: Thank you.

DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. TRIPP:

Q. Mr. Ballod, you are with Power Engineers, and you were working — worked on the site plan submission that we prepared?

A. Yes, I did.

Q. And that would be starting with Exhibit A-8, which is the site plan, if we could pull up Exhibit A-8.

A. A-8, okay. MS. MAGNA

MS. MAGNANI: Everyone see this? MR. TRIPP: Excellent.

BY MR. TRIPP:

Q. Okay. So referring to Exhibit A-8, can you just briefly review with the board the site plan changes?

A. Yes, the -- currently, the modular administrative complex is located within proposed Lot 1.02, it's there to the left of the -- just within the dotted box, where it's left center. It will be moved -- or it's proposed it would be moved to Lot 1.0, and it will be within and on the footprint of the existing tank number 3 foundation, which is the left of the three middle tanks. And that shows

the relocated administration modular building setup.

- Q. And the support structure access stairways will be installed. Is that correct?
- A. Yes, the support structure will be installed, which is -- which will elevate the administration module approximately 8 feet above the foundation, to get it at least 1 foot above the 14-foot flood elevation.
- Q. And that will comply with the borough's code, in terms of the elevation in that area?
 - A. Yes, it will.

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- Q. And we're not changing any grading in that area. Correct? We're just building --
- A. Correct, there's -- there's no grading changes. The building will just be moved in its entirety, and a new steel support structure will be installed, and the -- the existing buildings will be installed on top of that structural steel frame.
- O. And the applicant's also going to remove a portion of the tank containment wall, so that there's access and lines of sight between the buildings and the gas turbines. Is

that correct?

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- A. Yes, that is correct.
- Q. And is there any issue with removing a portion of the containment wall?
- A. No, there is not. There is no longer any fuel oil contained in any of these tanks. Tank 1 and 2 have been removed - excuse me, tank 2 and 3 have been removed. Tank 1 remains, and has only demineralized water in it.
- Q. Are we adding any lighting in the vicinity of the new structure, or the relocated structure, as the gas --
- A. Yes, exterior lighting will be added for the new platforms, stairways, and access [inaudible] will be pole-mounted lights, and also building-mounted lights, which is shown on Exhibit A-12. And this lighting will have no impact on adjacent properties.
- Q. And we're delineating eight parking spaces in the immediate vicinity of the relocated administration complex?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. And there's been a request in the professionals' reports to add a handicap space. Can that be accomplished?

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- Q. And we can agree to that as a condition of the approval, of any action the
- board may take? A. Yes.

A. Yes, it can.

- O. In terms of the utilities, there are going to be some utilities that are going to be relocated, that are shown on the plans.
- A. Yes, the utilities -- there will be electric lines running from the building. They're designated as -- where there's an RL going to the parking space. That's actually a lighting designation, but that dotted line which goes through the parking spaces to the upper left, that's the path of an underground electrical conduit, which goes from the existing distribution panel in the -- up at the top left, and it will go to the building. And, also, following that same route will be fiberoptic communications cables.
- O. And we're also adding a water supply line, and there's a modification to the sanitary sewer. Correct? And that's all shown on the plans?
 - A. Yes, correct.

O. In terms of refuse, there were dumpster locations that were shown on the plans?

- A. Yes, there's two solid waste dumpsters, up near the top center of the drawing.
- Q. And those dumpsters will have lids to keep the trash enclosed?
- A. Yes, they will have lids. And, basically, they are not visible to other properties; therefore, no screening is necessary around those dumpsters.
- Q. And, basically, at this point, there's no changes, other than what you just described, to the site. We're not proposing any new signage. The applicant, as far as you know, is not proposing any changes to site operations. The only thing that's going to change is the location of the administration building, and some of the utilities, the lighting, that you just discussed. Correct?
 - A. That is correct.
- Q. And you also heard Mr. Sens indicate that the access easement will basically maintain the existing access through that portion of the site to the remainder of the

site, it's just there'll now be a lot line there. So an easement will be created?

A. Yes.

- Q. And did you take a look at the access for emergency vehicles?
 - A. Yes, I did.
 - Q. And how will that be addressed?

A. I looked at a very large vehicle going through there, and, essentially — it's off the site plan there — the addition of a triangular portion created in that corner will help a large vehicle move through there, and make it so that vehicle can basically stay on the road without having to drive on the shoulders.

So what I would recommend, at this point, is a — a triangular section, approximately 20 feet on each side, be added, to make it possible for extremely large vehicles to get in through that easement site, into the substation area.

Q. And you will revise the plans to show that, and submit it to the board's professionals for their review, as a condition of any board action this evening. Correct?

A. Yes, I will.

Q. Thank you.

MR. TRIPP: I don't have any further questions of Mr. Ballod.

CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Thank you.

Does any members have any questions?

Jay?

MR. CORNELL: Mr. Chairman, just one item from our report that I don't think was addressed. The need for state and local permits associated with the application. Are there any DEP or other permits that are required?

MR. TRIPP: Well, we applied for county planning board, site plan, and subdivision approval, and we'll need Sayreville, at least, to review whether we needs Sayreville's soil.

We don't believe that we need any -and I believe Mr. Ballod can address this -- I don't believe we need any environmental permits based on the limited nature of what we're doing, and the location of what we're doing. Is that correct? Is that reviewed?

 $\ensuremath{\mathsf{MR}}.$ BALLOD: I believe that is correct.

MR. TRIPP: I do have a

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representative of ERM this evening who is here, who could be sworn in. I believe Adam Duskocy can be sworn in, and address it at greater length, but we don't believe what we're doing triggers any need for DEP approvals.

MR. CORNELL: That's fine.

MR. CORNELL: That's fine, Mr. Chairman. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Thank you, Jay. COMMISSIONER D'ADDIO: Mr. Chair, this is Mike D'Addio. Just a quick question for Jay.

Jay, are you comfortable with the statement of a large vehicle? I mean, what are we talking about? Are we talking about a Chevy Suburban or a tractor-trailer? I'd like it to be a little more specific in testimony.

MR. CORNELL: Mr. Chairman, I think that there was indicated earlier that that's something that would be reviewed, that they would provide us a turning template, and it would be the borough's largest piece of fire apparatus, that's typically what they've asked for. So they would provide a turning template for us to review, and based upon the limits of that turning template, we would request that easement -- make

sure that the easement is outside the limits of that turning template. But I think they've previously agreed to provide that information to our office for review.

MR. TRIPP: We did, and we also noted that there's sufficient room in that area, so that the easement can be enlarged to accommodate that, because there's no structures in that area, and that's already used for access. So we will certainly comply with that condition.


COMMISSIONER D'ADDIO: Okay. Thank you.

MR. TRIPP: Sure.

CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Thank you, Mike. Anyone else have any other questions? MR. FOWLER: Mr. Chairman, I have a

couple conditions, if I may.

Mr. Tripp, two things. I'm not sure which witness would testify to it, but in my report, I had asked about contamination issues be on the site, and the relocating of the new administration building, and whether or not that would be an area that would be tested, or -- to make sure it was -- ir it was clear of contamination, or if you already know that.



A D A M D U S K O C Y, having been duly sworn, testified as follows:

MR. ALFIERI: Can you please state

and spell your name for the record?

MR. DUSKOCY: Yeah, it's Adam

Duskocy, D-U-S-K -- Adam, A-D-A-M, Duskocy,

D-U-S-K-O-C-Y.

MR. ALFIERI: Can you please provide your qualifications for the board?

MR. DUSKOCY: Yeah, I have an honor's bachelor's of science degree in geology from McMaster University in Hamilton, Ontario, Canada. I am a professional geologist in the state of New Hampshire, and a licensed environmental professional in the state of Connecticut. DIRECT EXAMINATION

16 DIRECT EXAMINATION17 BY MR. TRIPP:

Q. And you work with ERM, and you're doing the environmental, and you're familiar with the environmental remediation on this

property. Correct?

A. I am, correct.

Q. And can you address the question as to whether there's any issues involved with relocating the modular administrative complex to

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its proposed location, in terms of any remediation, or remediation structures that might be in that area?

A. I can. The — yeah, the proposed relocation is going to be placed on top of the pad of former tank number 3. Assessment activities have been completed in that area, and the remedial approach for that area is simply the recording of a deed restriction for the use of the upper 2 feet of soils as a cap. So, as such, since the admin building will be placed on top of the — you know, the base of the former tank, there is no, you know, conflict with the proposed remediation.

- Q. And, also, your office had looked at whether or not the limited activities we're proposing triggered any requirement for a waterfront development permit also. Is that correct?
 - A. That is correct, yeah.
- Q. And you determined -- could you just explain your determination?
- A. I believe it was -- I believe it was not necessary, but I do, yeah.
 - Q. Okay.

CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Any questions from the board?

COMMISSIONER D'ADDIO: This is Mike D'Addio again. I just want to make sure Jay's okay with the -- did I miss it, or is Adam licensed in the state of New Jersey?

MR. TRIPP: He's not licensed in the state of New Jersey, but he's familiar -- he testified factually. He works for ERM, which is the environmental consultant. So he's able to testify as to, factually, what he's aware of, in terms of the environmental, based on his firm.

And I don't believe, as with a surveyor, or a professional engineer, or a planner, that we needed any specific -- he's qualified in his field, but he -- and I believe he's able to at least give the information that he was able to give.

COMMISSIONER D'ADDIO: All right. I just want to know if my attorney's okay with that.

MR. ALFIERI: I have no objection to

that.

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1 COMMISSIONER D'ADDIO: Okay. That's 2 it. Thanks. 3 MR. TRIPP: Thank you. 4 CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Thank you, Mike. 5 MR. FOWLER: Mr. Chairman, if I may, 6 just one other question directed to Jav. 7 Jay, a flood hazard area permit, is 8 that something that might apply here for the new 9 structure? And is it possible that we may seek 10 for them to get a jurisdictional determination to 11 see if there are no permits required from the 12 DEP? 13 MR. CORNELL: You can request that, 14 just to make sure. I think that, because they're not doing disturbance, they're basically taking a 15 structure and moving it on top of an existing 16 17 foundation, there's no disturbance in the flood 18 area. But to be safe, you could have them 19 approach the state and just get a determination 20 that the permit's not necessary. 21 MR. FOWLER: Thank you. 22 So does the board feel that they'd 23 like them to get a determination, that there are 24 no permits from the DEP that are required, or are

CHAIRMAN DAVIS: I'm satisfied, and I think the -- it's a de minimis move. Anyone else have anything to add? COMMISSIONER D'ADDIO: Yeah. Mr. Chairman, Mike D'Addio. Since they're going to go to the county for approval anyway, why don't we let the county decide whether they need to get DEP approval or not? MR. CORNELL: Mr. Chairman, typically, Middlesex County wouldn't review that issue. That would be something that really is an obligation that falls on the applicant. If it turns out he needs a permit and doesn't get it, he's the one that's going to have issues with the state. He did have some testimony saying permits were not necessary, and based on that, I think the board is covered. So he's really proceeding at his own risk, if he does work without

obtaining the proper permits from the state. CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Okay. COMMISSIONER D'ADDIO: Jay, you need to get a little closer to your mic when you speak, because it's a little hard to hear you. But I understand that he's doing it at his own risk, and if he doesn't get caught,

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that's fine, but that's not really the right way to do things. You really - if the DEP needs to be involved, or if they need to write off on it, it's not a big deal to -- just to show it to them, or - because we've had projects at SERA along the river as well, and the DEP's involved. and sometimes, where I feel or the board commissioners feel that the DEP doesn't need to be involved, they are involved. So I think it's not the worst thing in the world to just have them ask.

they satisfied with the applicant's testimony?

MR. CORNELL: Mr. Chairman, what I'd suggest is the applicant can contact the state and have what's known as a pre-application meeting. They can review the application with the state, and the state will indicate if any permits are necessary. So that may be a way, without making a formal application, to have that pre-application meeting, and get confirmation in that format that the permits are not required.

MR. TRIPP: We can do that. I think we can agree to that as a condition.

The only thing I would ask, if the board acts favorably on the application, that that be made a condition of site plan

specifically, so that we don't have to -- we were able to perfect the subdivision without getting that, because that only really deals with the relocation of the structures, and we'd like to be able to perfect the subdivision in the interim.

Plus, there are timelines, you have the 190 days to perfect it, and if there's any delay with DEP, we'd be concerned about that. So as long as the resolution, any resolution that the board adopts, is clear that that relates to the site plan and not the subdivision, we'd be agreeable.

COMMISSIONER D'ADDIO: Mr. Chairman, Mike D'Addio again, I have no objection to that.

MR. CORNELL: Mr. Chairman, I was going to say the same thing: The subdivision doesn't require permits; the question was about whether the building relocation does. So I don't think you need to tie the subdivision into the DEP; it's really the site plan you want to tie into the DEP.

CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Okay, Jim. You're okay with that, Mike?

COMMISSIONER D'ADDIO: Yes. MR. ALFIERI: I concur as well.

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MR. TRIPP: Thank you. Okay. The only thing I have left is brief testimony from our planner as to the planning variance, which I believe we just need to put on the record as to the sufficiency of meeting the criteria in Section 35 and Section 36 of the land use law. And I promise to be brief. CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Okay. KEENAN HUGHES, having been duly sworn, testified as follows: MR. ALFIERI: Can you please state and spell your name for the record? MR. HUGHES: It's Keenan Hughes, H-U-G-H-E-S. MR. ALFIERI: Can you please provide your qualifications for the board? MR. HUGHES: Yes, I'm a licensed professional planner; member of the American Institute of Certified Planners. I'm a principal with Phillips Preiss, which is a planning firm based in Hoboken, and I represent municipalities and private clients throughout the state on planning and zoning matters. And I've appeared as an expert in over 12 municipalities in Middlesex County.

MR. ALFIERI: Does the board accept the credentials?

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: So moved — DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. TRIPP:

Q. So, Mr. Hughes, can you just very briefly explain the nature of what is called a planning variance pursuant to the Municipal Land Use Law?

A. Yes. So under Section 35 of the Municipal Land Use Law, a building lot must abut a street giving access to the building or structure on the lot. And the street must be duly placed on the official map, or be an existing state, county, or municipal road, a street shown on the plan approved by the planning board, or a street by a file plat. So that's what's known as a planning variance under the Municipal Land Use Law.

Additionally, we are requesting relief from the Sayreville land use ordinance; specifically, Section 26-82.3, which also requires building lots to have street frontage.

So Section 36 of the MLUL allows relief, known as a planning variance, from the

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requirement of abutting a street in the following circumstances:

So, first of all, enforcement would entail practical difficulty or unnecessary hardship.

Secondly, where the circumstances of the case do not require the building or the structure to be related to a street.

And, third, the relief must be subject to conditions that provide adequate access for firefighting equipment, ambulances, and other emergency vehicles necessary for the protection of health and safety, and that will protect any future street layouts shown on the official map, or on the general circulation element of the municipal master plan.

So those are the criteria, and I think the case, as it's been presented tonight, clearly demonstrates that we can satisfy those criteria, for basically three reasons:

First of all, access to this site, and throughout the property, will be as it's always been. So no changes are proposed, other than the addition of this internal lot line to create the subdivision, which will separate the power plant from the remainder of the property.

Secondly, the driveway to the site at the end of River Road is efficient is sufficiently wide to accommodate emergency vehicles. You heard testimony earlier this evening that we're going to absolutely ensure that that's the case, and we have room to accommodate vehicles within -- by expanding the easement area, if necessary. Once an emergency vehicle is on the property, the existing internal road, which will be covered by the proposed easement, will provide access to the facilities on the remainder parcel, just as it always has.

And then, finally, it's important to note that no new structures are proposed that would create any access issues. The site plan only involves the relocation of structures, the delineation of eight parking spaces, and some lighting changes, and none of the utility work will affect access.

So for those reasons, the applicant can satisfy the criteria under Section 36 of the Municipal Land Use Law, in support of what's known as the planning variance.

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And, also, the board may grant relief from the borough ordinance provision relative to building lots having street frontage. So that concludes my direct testimony, Steve, unless you have anything further for me. MR. TRIPP: I don't have any further questions, unless the board does. CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Anyone have any questions? Hearing none, okay, thank you. Okay. So I'd like to open to the public. Can I have a motion? UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I'll make that motion. CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Second? UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Second. MS. MAGNANI: All in favor? (Whereupon, a voice vote is taken; a chorus of "ayes" heard.) MS. MAGNANI: Opposed? To help keep the meeting as organized as possible, residents who want to speak in one

will notify us that a person from the public wishes to speak. At that time, you will be asked for your name and address, and be limited to a five-minute comment period.

CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Seeing no one from the public, I'd like to close --

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Seeing no one from the public, I make a motion we close the public portion.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Second. CHAIRMAN DAVIS: All in favor? (Whereupon, a voice vote is taken; a

chorus of "ayes" heard.)

CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Any opposed?

Okay. Can we have a — can we sum it up, now?

MR. TRIPP: Yes. Just very briefly, this is an existing property that has several energy-related uses on it. What we're proposing is a subdivision, which makes sense, to separate out the power plant, so it can be owned individually. We're not changing any of the operations or structures, other than the relocation of the modular structures.

There are no variances created by the

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subdivision line, other than the variance relating to the requirement that the property abuts a public street, which Mr. Hughes addressed. This is an existing easement that has provided access to the property and to the uses on the property, and will continue to do so in the same manner. We just have to add an access easement across Lot 1.01 prior to the properties being under separate ownership, so that access is provided.

of the public portions are to press star 9, which

We've addressed all of your professionals' reports; we've agreed to comply, and agreed to all reasonable conditions.

So I believe that the application should be approved, subject to the stipulations and the conditions that were indicated on the record.

MR. ALFIERI: Mr. Chairman, if I may just run through the conditions before the board makes a determination, if they're going to vote favorably.

So one of the conditions is to submit a traffic plan — or circulation plan, I should say.

Second is make an application for a

pre-application meeting with the DEP, which will occur after or simultaneously with the

subdivision, and it would need to be completed prior to perfecting the site plan.

And compliance with both Mr. Fowler and CME's reports, dated October 10th and October 7th.

And any other outside agency approvals necessary.

CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Okay. Thank you. MR. CORNELL: Mr. Chairman, I think one more: The applicant agreed to install handicap ramp. That wasn't on the original plans and they've agreed to revise the plans to provide that.

MR. TRIPP: A handicap space?
MR. CORNELL: Yes, a handicap space.
MR. TRIPP: A handicap space, yeah.
CHAIRMAN DAVIS: What's your

pleasure?
